Christ is Risen.

There is a little debate about whether we should say “Christ has Risen,” or “Christ is Risen.” I go for the latter because Easter is not merely an event that happened in the past but a present reality. Christ is still risen, he remains alive. The Easter experience is an ongoing participation event, we share every day in His resurrection life. Our Easter faith is always in the present not in the past.

And if the Spirit of him who raised Jesus from the dead is living in you, he who raised Christ from the dead will also give life to your mortal bodies because of¹ his Spirit who lives in you. Romans 8:11.

One of the songs that has helped me most over the past weeks contains this line: “What’s true in the light is still true in the dark.” Today we celebrate the fact that Jesus is alive, He was raised from the dead by the power of the Father by the Holy Spirit and that same Spirit who raised Christ from the dead, lives in you. These things remain true, whether we are celebrating in the great congregation or at home by ourselves. These things remain true whether we are in perfect health or in sickness, whether we experience poverty or wealth, in good times and bad times, at all times we are resurrection people. That which we celebrated as truth in the light in past years remains true today, Christ is Risen.

The response to “He is Risen,” is “He is risen indeed,” or “Truly He is risen.” Today, as you read this, can you affirm that even in the midst of this present darkness you know that Jesus is alive?
